DAY 1: HOPE IN THE DARKNESS

Scripture Reading: Isaiah 9:2-7

Advent begins with a whisper of hope breaking into a world weary with shadows. Isaiah's prophecy speaks to a people walking in darkness, people who knew fear, uncertainty, and longing. Yet into that deep darkness, God promised a great light. This light would not come from human strength, political power, or earthly solutions. It would come from a child. A Son. A Savior who would carry names like Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, and Prince of Peace. Hope wasn't a feeling they had to manufacture; it was a promise God Himself declared. Advent reminds us that hope is not wishful thinking, but confident expectation rooted in God's unchanging character and faithful word.

Today, our world still feels the weight of night brokenness, grief, division, and struggle. But Advent invites us to lift our eyes and remember that the Light has already come and is still shining. Jesus entered our darkness, our pain, our sin, our fears to bring everlasting hope. As we begin this sacred season, we do not pretend life is perfect; instead, we dare to believe God's light is greater than the darkest night. This week, choose to anchor your heart in the One who keeps promises.

Let hope rise not because circumstances are certain, but because Christ is. The same Savior who came in Bethlehem will come again in glory. Until then, we wait with hope.

DAY 2: BOLD PRAYERS

Scripture Reading: Romans 15:12-13

The apostle Paul begins with the quote from Isaiah 11:10 calling out the Root of Jesse. This has a dual purpose. The first is challenging the Jewish peoples to accept Gentile worship. By calling out the Davidic Covenant, he is attempting to unite Jewish and Gentile worshippers through the common bond of "hope." The Davidic covenant also supports verse 13 in providing a clear example of God keeping His promises to his people and His word is never failing. This promise was kept in the birth of Jesus Christ.

Inspiration for this unity that Paul desires may have come from Jesus' prayer for all believers in John 17:20-26. In verse 23, Christ is praying for unity and then His "hope" is displayed in verse 24 that His followers be with Him in glory. Both prayers are unselfish and express the ultimate in others achieving joy and peace.

But Paul understands completely the limitations of the human mind. Often our display of hope is for the minimum. Likely our petition of abounding or overflowing with hope is only towards our bank accounts, our reception of love, or our health. How often when you pray for an outcome are you just asking for the minimum? Someone is sick, you pray for them to get well. But why not pray for a cure to the sickness for all? You pray for God's word to reach someone, but why not pray that God uses them in such a way that thousands come to know Christ.

Paul invoking the Holy Spirit to intervene and enable our prayers of hope allows us to tap into God's endless mercy and grace. Hebrews 4:16 says we should (boldly) approach the throne of grace with confidence, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help us in our time of need.

What should inspire our petition of "hope" this advent season? Revelation 5:5 declares the Root of David has triumphed. The fulfilling of the Davidic covenant through the Messiah whose own prayer of hope as seen in John 17 has been granted and declared a success. As you spend time in prayer this Advent season, remember that you can't "out pray" God's ability to grant mercy and grace. Be bold in your prayers.

Prayer

Jesus,

Help me approach Your throne with boldness and faith knowing that no matter the outcome You are still good! Today, help me share my faith story with someone who needs it! That their life would be

transformed by the Holy Spirit! In Your Name, Amen!

DAY 3: HOPE

Scripture Reading: Lamentations 3:21-24

Lamentations is a collection of five poems "lamenting" the destruction of Jerusalem by the Babylonians and the grief that destruction has caused. It attributes the suffering to the people's rebellion against God, but ends, as these verses show, with a plea for hope. Their hope is HOPE in the greatness of the Lord.

When we think about hope, do we think about hope as I hope my team wins; I hope I don't get sick; or I hope I get what I want for Christmas? That is hope with all small letters, a wishful thinking hope. Or do we think about HOPE as a confident expectation in God and his promises?

Christmas represents capital letter HOPE. God gave us the gift of HOPE when he gave us Jesus, when he sent a baby into the world to teach us how to live, then to die for our sins. His birth, death and resurrection give us the real HOPE. Let us enter the Christmas season with HOPE focusing on God's steadfast love and mercy as we await the greatest gift ever given.

DAY 4: PROMISE FULFILLED

Scripture Reading: Psalm 130:5-8

As a Christian most of us recognize that the season of Advent begins four Sundays before Christmas. During this time, we prepare ourselves spiritually and focus on hope, faith, joy, and peace. As shared in verses five and six, waiting is with our whole being and likewise where we should place our hope. While in verses seven and eight, we are told that waiting with hope should also be more than our personal aspiration. It should apply to our nation and world for we are all redeemed through Jesus for our sins.

I'd like to share some reflections on what Biblical hope looks like. In life we "hope" for many things, "I hope it rains", "I hope my team wins", "I hope today is a good day". The list is endless...

However, as the psalmist shares in these verses, we are talking about a different type of "hope", one that is a deeper spiritual and a religiously mature level of hope. Waiting from your soul is more profound, it's waiting from a deeper faith, with the recognition that God's promise or a prayer response is coming from our Lord. This hope is something we desire so deeply that our heart aches for it in anticipation.

To the Jewish people this waiting and hope was for the arrival and fulfillment of God's promise of the Messiah. For us, as Christians, we know that this promise was fulfilled with the birth of Jesus Christ. We now live in a time when the Jewish nation waited and hoped for the coming of the Messiah, we have "hope" with anticipation for Jesus's second coming.

Our hope is founded in the knowledge that we can trust, without doubt, that what God spoke will happen. He has promised us redemption from our sins and that Jesus will return. This hope is to be fulfilled and lead to a life everlasting in his heavenly presence. The psalmist states, "In his word I do hope, more than the watchman for dawn". Not only is the author saying that he has a personal hope but he calls the whole nation to come together in a communal hope with redemption from our iniquities.

As a Christian, I have experienced this level of deep heartfelt hope, sometimes from a place of despair and other times from anxious excitement. In both I am waiting for God's response from a deep spiritual place. A place where I feel at peace through prayer knowing that God hears my pleadings.

Jesus,

Thank you for the blessings that You have placed in my life and the salvation provided through Your Son and our Savior Jesus Christ. I give thanks for the birth of Jesus who gave His life so that we may be redeemed and live in eternity with You. In this season of Advent let us rejoice in His birth and grant us peace as we wait with a hopeful and expectant heart. Help us to have a Christian based hope, one that isn't anxious or worried, but one that is joyful with the knowledge that Your love is everlasting, and Your promises are always fulfilled. Amen.

Scripture Reading: 1 Peter 1:3-5

Advent invites us to pause in the tension between what has been fulfilled and what is still to come. In Christ's birth, God's mercy broke into the world; in His resurrection, that mercy gave us a living hope. Peter reminds us that this hope isn't fragile or fading; it's rooted in a Savior who has conquered death.

While so much around us changes, our hope is alive because Jesus is alive. We are born again into something eternal, unshakable, and kept safe by God's own power.

So often during this time of year, you will hear me remind us in our 10:04 worship times that the whole point of Christmas and Advent is Easter. This passage from Peter helps us remember that. We worship because of this living hope. In fact, the song "Living Hope" has become a central part of our worship in 10:04, and most of us would say it's one of our favorites. We sing this song in praise and celebration of the truth that because He was born in the form of a man to die and pay for our sins on the cross, and was resurrected to conquer death itself, we have freedom. We have a living hope in Jesus.

As we read the Christmas story each year, a major theme we see is the waiting, the anticipation, and the expectation of what is happening throughout all of creation. Many of us, when we take the time to pause in this busy season, understand this feeling. Waiting is hard; it can threaten to steal our hope. But when we cling to our living hope in Jesus and worship in our waiting, the joy of Advent and the power of the Resurrection always win.

As we wait for Christ's return, Advent teaches us to hope with confidence, not wishful thinking. The same God who fulfilled His promise in Bethlehem will fulfill His promise again when Christ comes in glory. In the meantime, we wait as people of resurrection, guarded by faith, sustained by grace, and anchored in an inheritance that will never spoil or fade. This is the hope that lights our Advent candles and carries us through every shadow: the living hope of Jesus Christ.

Jesus,

Help me to slow down and remember all that You have done for me and my family. I am so thankful for your goodness. Thank You for being my Living Hope! In every moment, good or bad, help me to give You praise! In You Name, Amen!

DAY 7: FAITH IN MOMENTS OF FEAR

ultimately going to be OK. How can Christians stay so calm in a crisis? How can we have faith that everything is going to be ok when everything seems to be crashing down around us? We have an everlasting joy because of what Jesus did for us: He saved us and is continuing to save us from sin, condemnation, and death.

The gospel message is the source of our joy. We've been saved by grace, and we've done nothing to earn it. Christians must cling to this truth! We should know that whatever happens in this lifetime, we have a "firmly established sense of well-being" because we know the Messiah, the Savior, the Lord, who was born on Christmas morning.

Scripture Reading: Isaiah 12:2

(Nahum 1:3) As Oswald Chambers penned, 'They are a sign that God is there. What a revelation it is to know that sorrow, bereavement, and suffering are actually the clouds that come along with God! God cannot come near us without clouds—He does not come in clear-shining brightness.' In our vernacular, the stage has been set.

Our path out of the rubble is determined by our response, how we choose to respond to God who is now in our midst. If deliverance is the desired result, then sing! Praise His worthiness in a manner that can be experienced by others. Refuse the myopic view of your present situation by focusing on Him, His character, His attributes, the history of things from which He has already delivered you. Draw Him nearer. Keep His audience. How? With praise! Remember, He inhabits the praises of His people. (Psalm 22:3 sort of)

His deliverance, your salvation, is the result of the strength, song, and salvation sequence. Just as you don't hope and pray that water will turn to ice when exposed to conditions at or below 32 degrees Fahrenheit (as hope and prayer are nonessential to the outcome), you can be confident that God will deliver you. Oh, and if your confidence is somewhat anemic, it will be strengthened as well.

Scripture Reading: 1 Thessalonians 5:16-18

Has something bad happened to you? Something disappointing? Maybe, as my friend Heather says, people are being people, and you find yourself walking through a valley searching for the mountain top. It's easy to read this passage, but it can often be difficult to put this scripture into practice. But here's what we need to understand: joy and happiness are not the same thing.

Circumstances make us happy or sad – they are temporary emotions tied to what's happening around us. But joy is different. Joy comes from the Lord. Joy is felt in our heart. There's a reason the beloved song reminds us that this joy can be found deep in our hearts (go ahead and sing it, I'll wait) - it's a place the world cannot reach. As Christians, we can rejoice even in hard and ugly times because we have the joy of knowing God's plan is bigger than us and any circumstance we face.

This Christmas season is a time to remember the joy of the Lord that came with the birth of Jesus. Try embracing the three practices from Thessalonians: First, "rejoice always" (vs 16). Remember that your joy is rooted in Christ, not in your circumstances. We get to choose what we

focus on. Will that be rejoicing in our blessings or wallowing in circumstantial loathing?

Second, "pray continually" (vs. 17). Do you have someone you call or text throughout the day or chat with frequently? Spouse, friend, sibling, child? God wants a similar relationship with us. To remind us that He's got this! Check in with Him like you would a close friend, sharing your frustrations, expressing gratitude, and asking for help and guidance.

Third, "give thanks in all circumstances" (vs. 18a). Even when things don't go the way you hoped, you can find reasons to praise the Lord – the people who have been sent to lift you up or introduce you to Christ, for the things that could have happened but didn't, for the opportunity to be loved by someone who is no longer here and being loved by those who are still with you. We have blessings upon blessings to be grateful for.

We need to practice shifting our focus from worldly things that let us down to focus on the joy of the Lord. A current contemporary Christian song reminds us, no matter the highs or the lows, if the world didn't give you joy, then the world can't steal it away.

As you move through today, shift your focus from finding happiness in things and people to finding

praise and thankfulness in God. His plan is greater than anything you could comprehend. Look back on all He's done in your life; how can you reflect on His faithfulness and still not trust that He knows best? Choose to rejoice. Choose to pray. Choose to give thanks. Choose JOY "for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus" (vs. 18b).

Help me to choose joy in every circumstance. No matter what I may face today, thank you for this gift. Thank you so much for blessing me today and always. You have never left me and for that I am grateful! I praise You! In You Name, Amen!

DAY 21: JOY IN THE MIDDLE OF THE MESS
